A. HISTORY OF THE SOFTWARE

Python was created in the early 1990s by Guido van Rossum at Stichting Mathematisch Centrum (CWI, see http://www.cwi.nl) in the Netherlands as a successor of a language called ABC. Guido remains Python's principal author, although it includes many contributions from others.

In 1995, Guido continued his work on Python at the Corporation for National Research Initiatives (CNRI, see http://www.cnri.reston.va.us) in Reston, Virginia where he released several versions of the software.

In May 2000, Guido and the Python core development team moved to BeOpen.com to form the BeOpen PythonLabs team. In October of the same year, the PythonLabs team moved to Digital Creations, which became Zope Corporation. In 2001, the Python Software Foundation (PSF, see https://www.python.org/psf/) was formed, a non-profit organization created specifically to own Python-related Intellectual Property. Zope Corporation was a sponsoring member of the PSF.

- `Flask-WTF`_ integrates with the Flask framework. It can automatically load data from the request, uses Flask-Babel to

translate based on user-selected locale, provides full-application CSRF, and more.

- `WTForms-Alchemy`_ provides rich support for generating forms from SQLAlchemy models, including an expanded set of fields and validators.

- `WTForms-SQLAlchemy`_ provides ORM-backed fields and form generation from SQLAlchemy models.

- `WTForms-AppEngine`_ provides ORM-backed fields and form generation from AppEnding db/ndb schema

- `WTForms-AppEngine`_ provides ORM-backed fields and form generation from Django models, as well as integration with Django's I18N support.
